Scope and Content

Materials in the collection of John Shuzo Tanaka were collected or created by Mr. Tanaka and consist of photo albums, Xeroxed

Japanese press, a copy of a Robert Rauschenberg CV, and a museum catalog from the Otsuka Museum of Art. Spanning from 1982 1998, the collection documents the collaboration between Otsuka Ohmi Ceramics Company (OOCC) and artist Robert Rauschenberg

that occurred in Shigaraki, Japan.

Processing

Given the impetus to preserve the collection's essence as a personal collection by Mr. Tanaka, photo albums and binders were kept in their original formats rather than rehoused. Archival rehousing was enacted to better preserve the loose photographs. They were provided without evidence of original order and reordered by subject.

Historical Note

John Shuzo Tanaka was born in Osaka, Japan in 1933. After acquiring an education in physics, Mr. Tanaka would become a sales representative in 1953, selling electron microscopes for the Hitatchi Scientific Instruments company. By February 1969, he would be their sole representative for sales in the United States, moving first to Sunnyvale, California before landing in Chicago. By 1977, Mr. Tanaka would change companies, using his professional and educational careers to become the office manager for the Chicago branch of the Japan-based Otsuka Chemical Company, a subsidiary of the Otsuka Pharmaceutical Corporation that sold large patented ceramic plates from the Otsuka Ohmi Ceramic Company (OOCC). In 1981, the Chicago offices would move to New York and begin expanding the marketability of their ceramic plates beyond architecture.

Colleagues Mr. Minoru Okuda, Director of OOCC, and Mr. Tadayasu Sasayama, a modern ceramic artist in Shigaraki, approached Mr. Tanaka with the idea to invite contemporary artists to make use of the OOCC's product as an artistic medium – specifically utilizing their technique of reproducing high quality images on the ceramic surface. Mr. Tanaka began calling New York contemporary artists and after a chance meeting with artist Robert Rauschenberg in his New York office and a followup meeting at the ceramics manufacturing location in Shigaraki Japan, Mr. Tanaka would become a liaison and interpreter for OOCC during their 1983 artistic collaboration with Robert Rauschenberg. As documented in the collection, this would include shared travels across Japan and various press events.

After completing the collaboration, Mr. Tanaka would continue his work with the Otsuka Chemical Company until their New York offices closed in 1987. Following this, he would create his own company, Lovion International, in Stamford, CT. He continued to stay in touch with Robert Rauschenberg, and has since retired and plans a return to Japan in late 2022.

Scope and Content

Materials in the collection of John Shuzo Tanaka were collected or created by Mr. Tanaka and consist of photo albums, Xeroxed Japanese press, a copy of a Robert Rauschenberg CV, and a museum catalog from the Otsuka Museum of Art. Spanning from 1982 – 1998, the collection documents the collaboration between Otsuka Ohmi Ceramics Company (OOCC) and artist Robert Rauschenberg that occurred in Shigaraki, Japan.

Depicted events include Rauschenberg's initial visits in 1982 to Otuska Ohmi Ceramic Studio in Shigaraki, Japan, and the subsequent studio activities and process shots taken during the collaboration including the creation of the Japanese Clayworks (1982/1985) and Japanese Recreational Clayworks (1982-83/1985). The travels shared by Mr. Tanaka, Rauschenberg, and Terry Van Brunt, including trips to Naruto Kanko Kisen and Hotsumisakiji Temple. As well a press event celebrating the collaboration, hosted by the Kyoto Broadcasting Co. at the KBS Hall in Kyoto, Japan. Attendees included Masahito

Otsuka – Former Director of the Otsuka Museum of Art and the founder of the Otsuka Pharmaceutical Corporation, and the Japanese artist Tar# Okamoto.

The collection also includes photographs of the 1991 opening of the exhibition "Rauschenberg Overseas Culture Interchange: ROCI USA" at The National Gallery of Art in Washington D.C. and early 1980's Xeroxed Japanese press reporting the collaboration, sourced from local and national Japanese press like Asahi Newspaper and The Japan Times in their original Japanese. Included as well is a 1998 Otsuka Museum of Art catalog portraying a survey of 100 artworks from the Museum's collection derived from OOCC's patented technique of reproducing high quality images of masterpieces on ceramic surfaces. Reproductions from this process were used by Rauschenberg when creating his Japanese Recreational Clayworks.

Notable artworks depicted include Gates: East (Japanese Claywork), 1982, and Dirt Shrine: East (Japanese Claywork), 1982.
